FISCAL YEAR 2024

Dear Friends,

The 2023-2024 school year was a landmark year for 826NYC. As we celebrated 20 years of inspiring young writers across New York City, we also reflected on the growth of our programs, the strength of our partnerships, and the impact our students made through the power of their words.

This year, we reached 3,600 students across all five boroughs, continuing our prioritized enrollment for those from historically marginalized and under-resourced communities. Our programs continued to expand, with 61 school partnerships and 15 student publications showcasing the incredible creativity of our young authors.

At our Youth Writing Center, our Write After School program flourished, providing elementary and middle school students with a space to develop their storytelling and communication skills. Our Write Away Workshops and Write Together field trips led students through imaginative journeys—from ghost stories to interstellar adventures. Meanwhile, the Teen Writers' Collective fostered a supportive community where teens refined their craft and found new platforms to amplify their voices. Students connected with professional writers across programs, including through a career-oriented panel for our teens and a special workshop series led by beloved children's book author Adam Rubin for middle grades.

We also deepened our partnerships with schools and community organizations. Our Extended Day program, a key pillar of our five-year strategic plan, expanded to bring writing programs directly into after-school programs across the city, ensuring that even more students had access to 826NYC's transformative approach to writing education. Through our Young Writers Publish residencies, students worked alongside educators to develop personal narratives, science fiction stories, and food writing projects, demonstrating the wide range of stories young people have to share.

The impact of our work was clear: 96% of students agreed that they could be creative and take risks in their writing with us, and 88% reported that 826NYC helped them improve their writing skills. Beyond the numbers, the true measure of our success was in the confidence and passion our students brought to their work. As one parent shared, "That class gave her confidence in her own words, even if they are unwritten and just in her head."

None of this would have been possible without our dedicated volunteers, supporters, and partners. This year, 240 volunteers contributed over 3,400 hours of service, ensuring that every student who walked through our doors received the mentorship and encouragement they needed to thrive. Our generous funders and donors, from foundations to individuals, invested in the power of youth storytelling, allowing us to grow and innovate in ways we never imagined 20 years ago.

Looking ahead, we remain committed to expanding our reach and impact, ensuring that more young people across the city have access to the resources, support, and inspiration they need to share their voices with the world. Thank you for being part of this journey with us.




OUR IMPACT

EXPLORING ENDLESS POSSIBILITIES THROUGH THE POWER OF WRITING

The young authors of 826NYC span the five boroughs, with youth from marginalized and underserved communities prioritized in enrollment. Our free after school programs are exclusively for families who demonstrate financial need, and we reserve 60% of spots in our weekend programs for students who would not otherwise be able to attend. Our partner-based programs focus solely on schools and community partners that serve under-resourced youth.



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WRITE AFTER SCHOOL

In Write After School, students stretch their literary imaginations and strengthen their core communication skills. Elementary and middle school students engage in activities that enhance reading, writing, social-emotional, and communication skills and participate in a Book Club.

WRITE AWAY WORKSHOPS

Ghost stories, sitcom scripts, and ordinary characters in extraordinary worlds are just some of the themes we explored in Write Away Workshops this year. Our students' stories spooked us, made us play the laugh track, and helped us look at the world in new and exciting ways.

Our Dungeons & Dragons & Writers workshop fuses the magic of storytelling with the classic tabletop role-playing game. In its 3rd year, D&D&W invited students to shape a story of interstellar adventure through the lens of dice rolls.

And our Extended Day program brought the magic of Write Away Workshops out of our Youth Writing Center and into the classrooms of school and community partners during after school hours.



TEEN WRITERS' COLLECTIVE

The members of our Teen Writers' Collective are young literary artists who learn from and uplift the work of their peers. They delved into genres and form, discovering new ways to get their voice and imagination on paper. TWC members also spoke at 826NYC events, and five members participated in our paid summer internships, leading programs with our younger authors.



WRITE TOGETHER

School groups from across New York City slip behind the secret door at our Youth Writing Center for Write Together, a collaborative writing adventure that encourages creative expression, explores the elements of storytelling, and strengthens students' writing skills.






We published their fantastical creations in *The Big Book of IFs*. Our students also attended an advance screening of the film with their families, and long-time 826NYC student Lhiam R. interviewed writer and director John Krasinski at the New York premiere. *The Big Book of IFs* has won two Anthem Awards in the Education, Art, & Culture category.



THE KELLY CLARKSON SHOW

Her soft hair with tones of gray


And I fell in love with that moment.




